New they were re-registered as a Secut Group (ideally a Troop, Pack and Crow) and eventually issued with new Hegistration Numbers (These actually did not come into effect until 1929 - and a complete list of the Bodford District GROUP Registrations is herewith)

with the Group System came cortain suggested changes in Administration and planning, and 1928 was in effect a year in which 'The Group' was finding its way. Competitions had to be goared rather differently so as to include three sections, so 1928 was the last year of the "Reff" County Challonge Flag and the Junior Thallonge Flag competitions (and both came to Bedford being wen by the 5th. Bods: and 15th. Beds: respectively). Other events of local interest were the Secut Swimming Competition - erganised by Bedford Swimming Club as part of its Annual Swimming Cale; (This was went by the 15th. Beds: with 19th. Beds: runners up); and the Tee N. Sports at Bedford Mosorn School Field - which had events for all Sections (This has, however, been described in the 1908 - 1928 Review).

But the Chief Svent of the Year was undoubtedly the Guide and Secut Rally in Russell Fork (Saturday 14th. July) when the Princess Reyal (H. E. H. Princess Mary) inspected Guides and Secuts of the County.

had to enter two Sections. Bodford L.A. did well at first attempt - the 18th. Bods. (Bodford Medern School) - with Troop and Pack entry - were winners. The lat. Bods and 15th. Bods. were lat. and 2nd respectively in the newly constituted Rover section.

The great event of this year was the Third (Coming of Age) World Jamberce at Arrows Park, Birkenhood. Bodford L.A. cent a complete composite Troop under D.S.M. M. F. G. Willson (es S.M.), D.S.M. J. Clarke (Sandy), O.S.M. D. Butters (7th), and G.S.M. F. W. Kuhlicke (18th) as A.S.Ma. Several Revers were also in the Auxiliary Camp. (As a pre-Jamberce 'get tempether' a Camp was held at Kompston Mill in mid-July).

Many of the local Troops attended the Annual Whitsun Comp at Westening.

The Tee H Sports were again held (quete "Bodfordshire Times") in the Bedford Hedern School Field on Wednesday and Thursday (11th. 12th. September). It was hoped that a large number of parents of Cube and Secuta would witness the sports, but few were present. This, however, did not damp the ardour of the youngsters and the events were contested with youthful enthusiams. They were indeed a happy band; each event took place to the accompaniment of lusty shouts of encouragement from members of the various treeps. While each Secut treep was bent on securing the coveted Walter Attenbourcugh Cup, the Cube were after the Kershaw Totom Pele. Some of the races run were typical of the pluck of the Boy Secut. In the three-mile race for Revers Turner set up a cracking pace, completing the first mile in just under four and a half minutes. It seem began to tell on him but he stuck it until he collapsed on the course. J. White (1st.Bods) the winner, made a great finish, sprinting the last 50 yards in fine style.

The events were varied and numerous and included a crab race, and hopping, obstacle and monkey races. Throughout both evenings the Tee E members were assisted by Scoutmasters and Scout officials. Among those prosent were Mr. Heward Spensley (Scounty Commissioner), Mr. M. Berrall, Mr. H.
Parrott (A.D.G. for Rovers), Mr. P. S. Smith (A.D.G. Scouts), Mr. M.F.G. Will

Butters.

At the close Mr. W. G. Marria (Chairman of hte Bedford Branch of Tee H) presented the certificates to the successful competitors, the Challenge Cup to the winning Treep, and the Totas Pole to the winning Chb Pack.

On the proposal of Mr. Willson, cheers were accorded the Tee H members, Mr. H. W. Liddle, M.A., for the use of the field, and Mr. Regers, the groundsman, who had worked so hard to make the sports a success.

Inyone who has been a member of the Scout Brotherhood anywhere in the world and has since left, is invited to be present. Very little is recorded ever the next two or three years on a District basis, which at first may seem rather strongs - as if Scouting had end -dealy come to a standatill - but the assess reason is seen apparent. The Great Industrial Depression was in full using (if that is the correct term), it had notually started in 1930. Secuting was very badly hit. Less of employment meant loss of Scouters, and several Groups - or sections - decord to function, some only temperarily, others did not revive, but Secuting continued, quite strongly too, at Group and inter-Group level.

The Sports (discontinued in 1930) were held in 1931, the Mooting taking place in Gardington Read Fields on lat & 2nd July, but the response was not very good. (The "Morahaw" Totam Fele was wen by 90th. Rods. Jubs and the "Attemborough" Jup by the lat. Reds. Treep)

1932 saw two local Svents in which Scents took part, The Mobbics & Mandicrafts Exhibition held in the Germ Exchange during February, and To Olde Englishe Engre in Mill Meedows on Thursday 28th. July (the latter secasion marking the visit of E.E.E. Frince George - later Buke of Eant).

Then in 1933 come the JAMECRALLY in Empthill Park, when we were visited by the Chief Secut and Chief Guide (Lord and Lady Baden-Fowell). This was of course, a County Swent. Also that your new the 4th. World Jambopes in Godel lo, Hungary, but as for so Badford was concerned it was for beyond our reach.

Those were the highlights of a very depressing period. 1934 showed some signs of a return to normal but it was not until the following year that Secuting District-wise really get into its stride.
